Schools

• To date, Sodexo has served over 8.7 million meals to Springfield Public Schools students since the program began on March 12th (meals included breakfast, lunch, dinner and snacks)

- Over 20,0000 laptops have been distributed to students for remote learning
 - o 10,000 laptops were given out over the summer, including to our homeless students
 - o 7,000 laptops were already distributed to our students before the pandemic
- iPads distributed to Pre-K students
- Out of an abundance of caution, pre-packaged lunches will be made available
